## 1 Learning Program

The SDGs Learning Program for No Poverty (SDG 1) at IPB University centers on reducing poverty, especially extreme poverty, through education, technology, and entrepreneurship. Leveraging IPB's expertise and aligning with Indonesia's national poverty reduction goals, the program supports the **Indonesia Emas 2045** vision, addressing poverty, stunting, and food insecurity in rural and suburban communities.

A notable event, **the Food Agriculture Summit** at IPB University, engages Indonesia's presidential candidates on agro-maritime strategies for poverty alleviation, focusing on agricultural policies that bolster rural livelihoods and food sovereignty. Innovations showcased by IPB and recognized by **the Ministry of Social Affairs** include agricultural technologies, poverty-mapping data analytics, and productivity-boosting interventions..

Inspired by IPB's **Wirausaha Merdeka** program, participants also learned to implement entrepreneurial training in vulnerable communities to support sustainable businesses and self-sufficiency. Insights from studies like **Rasyid Widada's Analysis** on suburban poverty guided discussions on tailored solutions for rural and suburban poverty challenges. Participants developed comprehensive poverty and health interventions based on discussions

interventions based on discussions led by figures like **Menko PMK Muhadjir Effendy**, emphasizing the link between poverty, stunting, and welfare. They also explored university collaboration with the Ministry of National Development Planning (Bappenas) on village-based poverty alleviation strategies, such as the **MBKM Desa Cemara** initiative.

## 2 Research and Innovation

IPB University's **PRIMESStep 2023** supports 14 startups focused on tech innovations in agriculture and food, providing incubation and training to foster sustainable businesses that drive job creation and poverty reduction, especially in rural areas, aligning with SDG 1. **Famlink**, a diagnostic tool for family resilience, enhances IPB's role in social innovation by identifying vulnerabilities early to support economic stability and well-being in at-risk families. Through its Science and Technology Park, IPB's **Business Incubation Program** offers startups mentoring, financial literacy, and resources, empowering them to grow, create jobs, and reduce poverty across urban and rural areas. **Kampung Ramah Keluarga** initiative reflects IPB's commitment to inclusive development by empowering women and families to build resilient communities.

### 3 Campus Operation

IPB University is dedicated to alleviating poverty and ensuring accessible education by supporting students from diverse backgrounds. **IPB University Sustainability Report 2023 page 32** details various initiatives, including tuition fee waivers and reductions for students facing financial challenges, promoting inclusivity and accessibility. In a recent initiative, IPB University introduced measures to ease the financial burden on students by offering **Tuition Fee Waivers and reductions (UKT)**. This program is designed to support students facing economic hardships, enabling them to continue their studies without the stress of financial constraints. Such policies not only promote inclusivity but also align with the university's commitment to making education more accessible to all.

With a robust framework of 95 **scholarship** funds and donors, IPB University has successfully provided tuition assistance to over 10,279 beneficiaries, ensuring that both domestic and international students receive the financial support and also supports Sustainable Development Goal No. 1 (No Poverty) by actively working to reduce barriers to

education and empower students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds.

Alumni contribute through a **Rp 3 billion scholarship fund** for tuition assistance, fostering a community-focused culture. Additional programs include **the Free Fruits and Milk Program**, various dormitory options for students (**regular, leadership, and agripreneur dorms**), and **affordable housing** for staff, enhancing support for the academic community. **Transportation facilities** are also available for students, staff, and lecturers, easing campus mobility and financial strain.



### 4 Community Engagement

The **Agrianita** organization at IPB University distributed 400 healthy meals to students facing food insecurity, promoting community support. Similarly, the **"Jumat Berkah"** program provides free Friday meals, creating a supportive environment for students and community members. IPB alumni also offer evening **meals** every weekday, supporting students in need and fostering solidarity. **Both alumni and university staff** play a vital role in philanthropy, especially during events like Ramadan, supporting vulnerable groups and building community. Beyond direct aid, IPB University collaborates with **PT Sriboga** to empower local MSMEs by enhancing product quality, benefiting local economic growth. Through **the**



**Saba Kampus** initiative, students help MSMEs improve product quality, gaining hands-on experience in entrepreneurship. Partnerships with the government address extreme poverty in regions like **Aceh Jaya and Pariaman**, translating research into impactful policies. Collaborations with **the Ministry of Social Affairs** empower at-risk groups to become economically independent, while IPB University and **the Ministry of Coordinating Human Development and Culture** and Culture work together to create sustainable poverty reduction strategies nationwide.



## 5 Student Activities

IPB University students are actively involved in community-centered initiatives to address food insecurity, economic empowerment, and poverty alleviation. **FEMA Berbagi**, organized by students from the Faculty of Human Ecology (FEMA), provides biweekly food support to 100 students in need, easing food insecurity and the financial burden of meals. In a similar spirit of support, the **Waste for Iftar** initiative by BEM FEMA and IGAF (International Association of Students in Agricultural and Related Sciences) encouraged community members to recycle waste during Ramadan, exchanging it for free iftar meals. This initiative not only raised environmental awareness but also relieved food costs for low-income families.

Additionally, IPB students have

extended their support to local MSMEs (Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises) in Bogor, offering **digital marketing** assistance to boost these businesses' online presence and income potential. **Vocational students** have also contributed by providing technical support to MSMEs, enhancing productivity and income, which supports business sustainability and economic growth in the region.

Rural empowerment is a key focus of **Sahabat Desa**, a project by the Faculty of Economics and Management (FEM) students, who provided financial literacy and agricultural training to improve livelihoods and address poverty in rural communities.

Furthering their impact, IPB students collaborated with **UPZ Al-Hurriyyah** to evaluate economic empowerment programs, identifying areas for improvement to strengthen poverty alleviation efforts. Together, these initiatives reflect a unified effort to support vulnerable communities and promote sustainable development.
